



TIP OF THE MONTH #13 | BAD LUCK OR BAD MANAGEMENT?



Bidding: South opens 1D, North responds 2D, and South bids 3NT.

Lead: West leads QH.

Play: How would you plan the play?

The defenders' hands are not there to help you (!). There is only one way to play this hand correctly. This is not a difficult hand <u>as long as</u> you spend a little time thinking and planning. The lead puts you under pressure straight away...as soon as you lose the lead, you will likely lose another 4 heart tricks and go light. You have 8 top tricks, and diamonds are the obvious source of more. With 9 diamonds the odds must be in your favour.

What can go wrong?

A 4:0 diamond break is what. But think one step further....if the J1086 of diamonds are on your right, there is nothing you can do about it...you will go down. BUT, if the diamonds are all on your left, you can still make it....<u>play the QD first</u>....if both defenders follow, you will make 10 tricks... easy. But if East shows out, you lead small to the AK9 (twice), and you catch all the diamonds....contract made, with an overtrick.

Lessons

- 1. A 4:0 split does not occur often, but neither is it rare...it will happen about 1 time in 10.
- 2. When a contract seems "easy," have a discipline of checking to see "what could go wrong," and playing accordingly.
- 3. With 2 honours in one hand and one in the other, we are taught to play first from the hand with 2 honours. This is the exception (4:0, where the 4 has the J10)...only one hand can finesse both J and 10. If the missing cards are Jxxx, then play the first honour from the hand with 2, as you can the still often finesse either way.

Our Air-conditioning System... in practice

It is a big challenge for any air-

conditioning/heating system to provide perfectly balanced temperatures over time, especially in a large space. This fact, combined with the undeniable large range in people's "temperature sensitivities" makes for a recurring challenge (not unique to Tauranga Bridge Club).

In general, our air-conditioning system works well. However, there is no doubt that at times certain parts of the room have their own "microclimates." This is, in part, due to the location of fans in the ceiling space, directed in varying directions through ceiling vents. No "perfect settings" can please everyone.

It would be appreciated if:

- Those who periodically "feel the cold" could consider bringing "an extra layer"... just in case;
- Those who are relatively intolerant of warmer temperatures could consider wearing lighter clothing (with or without an extra layer which can be easily removed); and...
- Access to the temperature control settings could be restricted to select Committee members and session Directors only...lots of different people "playing with" the settings adds a certain further challenge!

Bridge is all about partnership understanding both in bidding & defending. Given you are likely to be defending twice as often as you are Declarer or Dummy, this is where the game can be won or lost!

DISCARDS

There are quite a number of fancy & useful discard systems around. Don't get into them until you have mastered a simple discard system. It is preferable you discard what you don't want & hang onto the suit you do want, so you eventually win some tricks.

I suggest you start with either Attitude or Reverse Attitude

Attitude = high card you like the suit you are dis carding, low card you don't. This is the most basic system & maybe what you were taught.

Reverse Attitude is the opposite. High card you DON'T like the suit you are discarding, low card you do. In order to remember, many say to themselves "Low I like." Personally I prefer this option, as you are not wasting a high card to encourage your partner. That high card may come in useful later on. **PLEASE NOTE:** in using Reverse Attitude, you play low if you have a doubleton if you want to encourage your partner. Playing high-low is discouraging! This may feel a bit odd to start with, but you will get the hang of it.

SIGNALS

What are these? This is another word for encouraging or discouraging your partner on their lead. For example, your partner leads an Ace of hearts and you have the King of hearts and want the suit continued. The basic way people play this, is as per the discards above -Attitude or Reverse Attitude. For this example (playing Reverse Attitude), you play the lowest heart you have to say "Partner, I like your lead!"

Whatever you do, before you start playing a session, agree with your partner what your signals & dis cards are and stick to it.

Tip: When there is a singleton in Dummy of the suit you lead, partner can signal what suit to switch to. A high card means the highest of the other 2 suits (other than trumps) and a low means the lowest of the other 2 suits.
